


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Dropout Rate for WCPSS: 2012-13

Despite increases in student membership each year, WCPSS continues to maintain a steady decline in dropout counts. In 2012-13, the WCPSS high school dropout rate fell to 1.95%, its lowest rate ever. The WCPSS rate is lower than the state's rate, and also the lowest of the other four large school districts in North Carolina (Guilford 2.07%, Forsyth 2.72%, Mecklenburg 3.02%, and Durham 3.21%). WCPSS dropout rates by ethnicity in 2012-13 also fell for all subgroups, with Black/African-American students experiencing the largest drop of 1.8 percentage points, from 4.6% in 2011-12 to 2.8% in 2012-13.

Evaluation of the Intensive Summer Pilot Program: A High School Success Pilot Pr

This report presents findings from the evaluation of the Intensive Summer Programs (ISP) pilot program, implemented during summer 2008 and summer 2009. ISP is one of three grant programs grouped together as the High School Success Pilot Programs (HSSPP).1 The other two programs are the Mathematics Instructional Coaches pilot program (MIC) and the Collaborative Dropout Reduction pilot program (CDR). Collectively, these three grant programs, among others, were authorized and funded by the 80th Texas Legislature in 20072 so awarded local education agencies (LEAs [school districts and open enrollment charter schools]) could develop and implement projects to prevent and reduce dropout, increase high school success, and improve college and career readiness in public schools.

Our district practitioners write outstanding reports every year, but don't step them through the process to be published in journals. In many ways, findings in these publications are more debated and their recommendations followed in schools and districts than those in journals. This led to the now famous quote about these publications, "Dog-eared reports are the best of breed!" The great news is that thanks to the insight of Dr. Freda Holley, formerly of the Austin (TX) Independent School District back in the 1970's, we have a publications competition to encourage and recognize excellent research and evaluation. Not only that, she somehow negotiated with AERA to get Division H an exhibit booth each year at the Annual Meeting. So, for the past 35 years or thereabout, the entries have been displayed for attendees to see.

Reconstructing the history of the publications award is in progress. I can recall that in the first year, James Popham, the AERA President, attended the Division H Business Meeting at the Annual Meeting and handed out the awards.
